**Objectives:**

Objective No.	It is an objective of the Council to:
T-1	Provide for continuous walkway footpath within the village while protecting features of biodiversity and cultural importance.
T-2	Provide a recreational walking trial focusing on the village stream and along the disused railway line, interconnecting with existing and proposed residential developments, in a manner compatible with the Natural Environs, Flood Risk Management, Built Heritage and Archaeology Objectives of this Plan.
EE-1	Provide for light industrial uses / enterprise units at appropriate locations.
A-1	Facilitate the sustainable development of a town park and playground
A-2	Encourage the sustainable development of adequate sporting and leisure facilities
A-3	Promote the sustainable development of a linear river side amenity area/walkway in a manner compatible with the Natural Environs, Flood Risk Management, Built Heritage, and Archaeology Objectives of this Plan.
EN-1	Promote environmental improvements designed to upgrade the streetscape and add continuity to an otherwise disjointed streetscape while protecting features of architectural and cultural importance.
NE-1	Preserve any existing mature trees where possible and promote additional planting of native trees and shrubs in new developments.
MU-1	Make provision for the environmentally sustainable expansion of the village centre, retail, service uses, and amenity space while protecting features of biodiversity and cultural importance.
